#### **TITLE 24 NEWS**

Because of computer software that has not been completed by the state, the California Energy Commission (CEC) has voted for a six month delay in the implementation of

section the energy of Title 24. That means it will be effective July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014, instead of Jan. 1st. (See the notice below from the CEC.) Although some lighting control installations and acceptance testing work will be postponed, unfortunately, there is nothing we can do about it.

We know that you, our **IBEW-NECA** colleagues, have worked very hard to prepare for the new code by training and registering hundreds of acceptance and contractors. testers Delay or no delay, what accomplished you've greatly appreciated and still very valuable to **IBEW-**NECA. Here's why:

 Even with the delay, the CEC did not change the requirement for at least 300 acceptance testers to be registered by mid-December.

CONGRATULATIONS, WE PASSED THE 300 MARK!

- Everyone who has already trained and registered for acceptance testing did so at a lower fee and in fewer hours than will be required after January 1<sup>st</sup>. This early effort saved electricians, contractors, JATCs, locals, chapters, and LMCCs significant amounts of time and money.
- To facilitate more lighting control installations and acceptance testing work, counties, cities, and towns need to fully understand the new Title 24. We now know have six months to help inform building department officials and increase compliance.
- The energy efficiency section of Title 24 will go into effect on July 1<sup>st</sup> and we will be ready.

## CODE QUESTION OF THE DAY

#### Question:

Are 208 volt 20 amp receptacles in commercial kitchens located by a sink (within 3 feet) required to be GFCI protected? This is for a steam tale located by a serving line in a hospital cafeteria.

#### **Answer:**

NEC 210.8(B)(2) requires all 15 and 20-ampere, 125V kitchen receptacles in nodwelling unit kitchens to be GFCI protected. There is no requirement for 208V or 220V receptacles to be GFCI protected – see more at http://www.necaneis.org/cqd/index/cfm?fa=s how&id=4163#sthash.iLACa Bbx.dpuf

#### **AULD LANG SYNE**

The most commonly sung song for English-speakers on New Year's eve, "Auld Lang Syne" is an old Scottish song that was first published by the poet Robert Burns in the 1796 edition of the book. Scots Musical Museum. Burns transcribed (and made some refinements to the lyrics) after he heard it sung by an old man from the Ayrshire area of Scotland, Burns's homeland.



It is often remarked that "Auld Lang Syne" is one of the most popular songs that nobody knows the lyrics to. "Auld Lang Syne" literally translates as "old long since" and means "times gone by." The song asks whether old friends and times will be forgotten and promises to remember people of the past with fondness, "For auld lang syne, we'll take a cup o' kindness yet."

The lesser known verses continue this theme, lamenting how friends who once used to "run about the braes./ And pou'd the gowans fine" (run about the hills and pulled up the daisies) and "paidl'd in the burn/Frae morning sun till dine" (paddled in the stream from morning to dusk) have become divided by time and distance— "seas between us braid hae roar'd" (broad seas have roared between us). Yet there is always time for old friends to get together—if not in person then in memory-and "tak a right quid-willie waught" (a good-will drink).

But it was bandleader Guy Lombardo, and not Robert Burns, who popularized the song and turned it into a New Year's tradition. Lombardo first heard "Auld Lang Syne" in his hometown of London, Ontario, where it was sung by Scottish immigrants. When he and his brothers formed the famous dance band, Guy Lombardo and His Royal Canadians, the song became one of their standards. Lombardo played the song at midnight at a New eve party at the Year's Roosevelt Hotel in New York City in 1929, and a tradition was born. After that. Lombardo's version of the song was played every New Year's eve from the 1930s until 1976 at the Waldorf Astoria. In the first years it was broadcast and then radio, television. The song became such a New Year's tradition that "Lifemagazine wrote that if Lombardo failed to play 'Auld Lang Syne,' the American public would not believe that the new year had really arrived."

The first class we will be offering is **TEST INSTRUMENTS**. This class is NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE. There is no cost for Local 234 members. However, a \$50 deposit is required, which is refundable upon successful completion of the class.

The Test Instruments course begins introducing by safety requirements for using test instruments. The course proceeds into the specific industry applications for standard test instruments. An of overview measurement principles and test instrument procedures are covered along with an explanation of personal equipment protective specified in NFPA 70E.

We are able to enroll you in the course once you have registered on the website and made your \$50 deposit. A text book will be mailed to the JATC to accompany the online coursework. Credit cards may be taken over the phone or you may pay by check.




#### LOCAL #234 AVAILABILITY LIST UPDATE
